# From the Desk of Pastor Richard

When the weather begins to turn warmer and the days grow longer, I can't help but think of major league baseball. The COVID-19 pandemic has limited the ability and desire of sports fans to attend games in-person. Because of this, most fans have resigned themselves to the reality that they have to watch or listen to games from home. But, for my money, there's nothing quite like the experience of attending a ball game in-person. One of the family events I most loved when I was a kid was a trip to see the Philadelphia Phillies play. While the games were enjoyable, I most looked forward to a visit to the concession stand. Most people associate baseball with peanuts or hot dogs, but for me, the snack of choice was a soft pretzel.

There's an interesting story behind my favorite baseball food. The pretzel was historically a Lenten symbol. Before we get to how the pretzel is related to Lent, a brief history of Lent is in order. In the first century, Lent lasted just forty hours. The forty-hour observance was to remind people of the time that Jesus spent in the tomb. Easter was celebrated after Lent, which ended at 3:00 A.M. Imagine waking up for that sunrise service! Later, the forty-hours of Lent became what we now know as Holy Week, and Lent became the thirty-six days immediately preceding Holy Week. Why thirty-six days? This number was chosen because thirty-six is a tithe, or ten percent, of a year. In the eighth century, four days were added to Lent to make the season a total of forty days. This change probably seemed appropriate since Jesus spent forty days fasting in the wilderness. The forty days of Lent, which we observe to this day, are an opportunity for us to refocus on the cross of Christ Jesus.

Now back to the pretzel and what it has to do with Lent. As far back as the fifth century, Christians would make a Lenten snack that consisted of flour, salt, and water. They would mix these ingredients into a dough that they would shape to look like two crossed arms. This snack, which came to be known as the "pretzel" centuries later, was only eaten during Lent. The pretzel served as a reminder to Christians that they should pray continually. We, too, are invited to pray regularly during the season of Lent as we prepare to witness once more God's great sacrifice through Christ Jesus. May God bless your continued Lenten journey.

### NEWS FROM THE RABE FAMILY SERVING IN ETHIOPIA Timket—Ethiopian Epiphany

January brought the annual celebration of Timket or Ethiopian Epiphany. While all the Christians celebrate the holiday in Ethiopia, it is the Ethiopian Orthodox who have the biggest celebration. This elaborate celebration lasts two days, and closes down streets so that folks can "make way" for the priests that carry the Talbot (a model of the Ark of the Covenant). Large crowds of people of all ages walk alongside with the priests, along with many choirs who process from church to local river where they will then spend the night. Why go to a local river? Because this Orthodox celebration focuses on Jesus' baptism in the river Jordan!

The people along with the priests will spend the night next to the river where choirs will continue to sing and people will then gather for a worship service and the river. The following day the priests, with the Talbot, will process back to the church.

Each year when I watch the Ticket celebration I am reminded of a couple of things, first the celebration points us to Christ's baptism, and second it is the start of a new academic semester! And, thanks be to God it is a new semester! I am excited that we are able to be in the classroom and teach our students about Christ and the free gift of life and salvation! Spring semester is under way!
